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# Dutch Summer Institute at the University of Minnesota

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#### The Amsterdam/Maastricht Summer University

This summer program offers a variety of courses in the areas of Cultural Studies and Art History, Economics and Politics, Health Sciences and Medicine, Language, Law and Public Policy, and Media Studies and Information Science. 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# Intensive Dutch Language Course

In association with the Institute for Dutch as a Second Language (INTT) of the University of Amsterdam, an intensive Dutch language course is held from **August 6 to 31, 2001**.

There will be groups at four levels with a capacity of 14-18 participants each:

Level 1: Absolute Beginners: For students with no previous knowledge of Dutch.

Level 2: Beginners: For students who do understand some Dutch but are (almost) incapable of making themselves understood in Dutch.

Level 3: Intermediate: For students with a basic understanding of everyday Dutch, capable of making themselves understood in Dutch.

Level 4: Advanced: For students with a good understanding of simple everyday Dutch who want to understand authentic Dutch at an academic level and who want to learn how to express themselves in formally correct spoken and written Dutch.

Note: Those who have no problems understanding Dutch at an academic level are too advanced for these courses.

In the courses for (absolute) beginners the language of instruction is English and Dutch. In the other courses, the language being used in the classroom is mainly or exclusively Dutch. On the first day of the course each participant's level of command of the Dutch language will be assessed to make sure everyone is placed in the right group. The course lasts four weeks. It involves four hours of teaching a day. The lessons are scheduled between 9 a.m. and 1 p.m. every day, apart from the Wednesdays in the 2nd, 3rd and 4th week. On those Wednesdays, participants who wish to do so, can make appointments with their teachers. Participants are expected to do two or three hours of homework a day. All lectures are given in buildings of the University of Amsterdam, located in the historic center of Amsterdam.

The course fee is DFF 1850 (EURO 839,49). The course fee covers all study material during the course (but not the textbooks). A pass for the language laboratory and free access to the cultural program of the Amsterdam-Maastricht Summer University are included.

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# Effective Use of the Internet in Language Teaching: What & How

This course is offered from **August 20 to 24, 2001**, by the Graduate School of Teaching and Learning (ILO), University of Amsterdam.

In this course the possibilities that the Internet offers to language teachers will be examined, always keeping in mind under what circumstances these

possibilities can be effectively used in classroom practice. How can you find useful information on the WWW? How can e-mail and chatting be used to improve the fluency of your pupils? In which ways can you use web sites for interesting language activities? How can you create your own language exercises with free software? The focus will not be on the technology itself, but on its implications and added value for language teaching. If you cannot teach in a state-of-the-art computer lab, if your pupils cannot work online, you can still take advantage of the Internet for your classroom practice: one computer with an Internet connection is enough to get plenty of web-based materials for your lessons.

The idea of this course is "learning by doing": every day there will be workshop sessions. Participants will be actively involved and will develop - alone or in small groups - language activities and exercises for use in their lessons.

The course is intended for newly qualified and practicing foreign language teachers interested in the possibilities of the Internet for their classroom practice. A basic knowledge of computers is necessary: participants should at least be familiar with Windows (or Mac) platforms and word-processors. Course capacity is 30 participants and language of instruction is English.

This course will be held in the building of the Graduate School of Teaching and Learning, University of Amsterdam, Wibautstraat 2-4, in the city center.

The course fee is DFL 1400 (Euro 635,29), including lunches and free access to the cultural evening program of The Amsterdam-Maastricht Summer University. 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# Recent Developments in the Study of 17th Century Dutch Art

This course is offered in association with the Rijksmuseum Amsterdam and the Netherlands Institute for Art History (RKD) in The Hague, from **August 12 to August 24, 2001**. It is primarily intended for graduate students and professional art historians specializing in the field of Netherlandish art.

This two-week course consisting of lectures, excursions and workshops, will be held in several locations such as the Rijksmuseum in Amsterdam, the Historical Museum Amsterdam and the Netherlands Institute for Art History in The Hague. The aim of the course is three-fold: participants will gain knowledge on the available research facilities in the field of Dutch art in the Netherlands, an overview of developments and insights in the study of 17th-century Dutch art will be presented and ample opportunity for discussion on questions of methodology and other related subjects will be provided.

Special topics will be: the changing perception of 17th-century Dutch art, problems in interpretation and the possibilities and limitations of archival and documentary research. A series of workshops on 17th-century paintings, prints, drawings, sculpture, architecture and applied arts will be organized as well as visits to different monuments and public and private collections.

The course fee of DFL 1750 (Euro 794,12) includes lunches, transport to The Hague as well as free access to the cultural program of The Amsterdam-Maastricht Summer University. Candidates should submit their application (available from the web site at

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# Boswell Institute Intensive Dutch Summer Courses

The Boswell Institute of the University of Utrecht offers several intensive Dutch summer courses at three levels (beginners, intermediate, and advanced), dependent on sufficient enrollment. The courses will be held from **July 16 to August 3, 2001** and **August 12 to August 31, 2001**. Courses will have approximately 16 participants each and provide a total of 66 hours of instruction plus homework.

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Other courses of interest offered by the James Boswell Institute include the following:

Advanced Dutch language acquisition and Dutch Literature Aan de mond van al die rivieren This is a combined course in literature and language acquisition for advanced students of Dutch who study *neerlandistiek* abroad. The language acquisition component aims to improve both oral and written language proficiency. The literature component presents an overview of Dutch literature from 1850 to the present. Each component consists of 20 classroom hours. Average group size is 12 participants. Students need a language level comparable with at least the level of the Certificate of Dutch as a Foreign Language 'Advanced Knowledge' (*Uitgebreide Kennis*).

#### Dutch Language and Culture for Interpreters

Developed specifically for interpreters, the objective of this course is to provide insight into the Dutch language and culture. Instruction is aimed at improving listening skills and increasing vocabulary. Besides attending classes, students attend lectures given by experts from Utrecht University on a variety of subjects. Topics include: the role of water in Dutch society, the Dutch self-image, the justice system, the environment, the monarchy, education, agriculture, and fishing.

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## **Initiatief Nederlands**

Antwerp University will hold an intensive Dutch summer program from **July 10 to 25, 2001**. Students will be taught in small groups with a maximum of 15 participants each and will receive individualized instruction. Courses are offered at three levels: absolute beginners, basic, and proficiency:

Dutch 1 is intended for people who have no or very little previous knowledge of Dutch. The basic teaching aid is the vocabulary workbook WOORDWIJS, which presents the 1,000 most frequently used Dutch words in meaningful communicative settings. The structure of the language is studied by means of authentic and functional texts and tasks. Furthermore, audio and video materials are used.

Dutch 2 uses a communicative approach based on the workbook WOORDVAARDIG (containing and extending the 2,000 most frequently used words). Apart from a short repetition of basic structures new grammatical topics are introduced and practiced in authentic contexts. Listening and speaking are improved by video materials presenting socio-cultural aspects of Flanders.

Dutch 3 is intended for people who have acquired the basis of Dutch but who want to perfect their knowledge. People who will benefit are: students of modern languages, pupils who intend to study Dutch at university or graduates who need Dutch for working purposes, etc. The workbook WOORDWIJZER presents the participants with a variety of exercises, texts, and tasks preparing them for different linguistic situations. Considerable time is spent on conversation. The topics are introduced by means of authentic video materials.

Classes are held from 9:00 to 4:00 each day, with optional cultural excursions during the weekends. Participants who successfully complete the course

will receive a certificate. Deadline for enrollment is **July 1, 2001**.

The eighth year book, The Low Countries. Arts and Society in Flanders and the Netherlands 2000, has been published. The articles in this year book, by contributors from the Low countries and abroad, survey the living, contemporary culture of the Low Countries as well as their cultural heritage. In its words and pictures, The Low Countries provides information about literature and the arts, but also about broad social and historical developments in Flanders and the Netherlands.
