· Balancing supply and demand

Blood Bank Emergency Preparedness

Goal: Get Blood Products to Patient Safely but as quickly as possible.

- 1. Adequate Blood Inventory
- · Group O packed cells
- Group A plasma
- 2. Adequate Staff
- 3. Adequate Supplies

MTP Activations

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MTP Trauma Activations - Change

Heart rate >110 Systolic BP <90




Penetrating mechanism

Positive FAST (Focused Assessment with Sonography for Trauma)- Bleeding from any organ in the chest, abdomen and pelvis including the heart itself

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
MTP Activations



"Ideal" World


- Currently about 30 MTP activations per month
- · Ideally one per day
- · Eight red cell units per MTP
- · Inventory management simple


Sample Month of Traumas



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
Sample Month of Traumas

Total RBCs 15 16 17 18


Sunday Morning: MTP Activations

Inventory Management Response

- Red Cell Inventory Increases (±500)
- O neg: 40
- O pos: 60
- A pos: 15
- Plasma Inventory Increases (±300)
- A: 60

Trauma Management Before Arrival

- · Helicopters (3 bases)
- 2 Group O negative red cell units
 American Callege of Surgeons. "In-flight blood transfusions increase survival rates, improve trauma patient outcomes.

ED Emerge Fridges

- Adults
- 8 Group O pos RBCs
- 6 Group O neg RBCs
- 4 Group A plasma
 Safety of the use of Thaved group A plasmain Trauma- The STAT Stu
- Adding Group O Whole Blood (low titer)
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Trauma Arrival to PEDS ED

Pediatrics ED Fridge

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- 2 Group O neg RBCs
- 1 Group AB plasma



Trauma Arrival to Operating Room

Connected to Power Supply Rees probes RFID tagged Stocked with: 4 Group O RBCs: 4 Liquid A Plasma Add 1 platelet pheresis at issue. Paper work ready Units labeled with: Uncrossmatched Blood Stickers



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Inventory Management – Demand Exceeds Supply

- · Pull units already allocated to patients
- Medical Director/Path Resident Triage
- STAT blood orders order early

Inventory Management

- Maintain inventory levels for traumas due to distance from blood supplier
- Inventory Based on Distance from Supplier
- Group A plasma
- Decrease the need for AB Plasma
- Liquid Group A plasma
- Other Blood Suppliers
- Blood Buy
- · O neg frozen inventory

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Stay Calm and Blood Bank On!



- Plan for the worst case scenario.
- Have protocols in place so that staff can function quickly and safely.
- Listen to staff concerns.
