



Brewer promoted to regional director for NC Community Foundation in southeastern region

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Angie Brewer has been promoted to regional director for the North Carolina Community Foundation, according to Sally Migliore, director of community leadership.

As regional director, Brewer has management responsibilities for NCCF's affiliate foundations in Brunswick, Columbus, Duplin, New Hanover, Onslow, Pender, Robeson and Sampson counties and a women's giving circle in New Hanover County. She previously worked in a similar position as a regional associate with NCCF. Titles were expanded to more aptly reflect the scope and depth of this position's duties, Migliore said. "In the capacity of facilitating board leadership in the southeastern region, Brewer develops and supports the boards' work to grow philanthropy, build endowments and administer local grantmaking in their counties," she said. NCCF has eight regional directors who oversee affiliate activities in regions that directly serve 67 counties in the state.

Brewer has more than seven years' experience as a community outreach and investment specialist for a global company where she led employee volunteers in developing strategic engagement, grantmaking and funding approaches in their local communities. She earned a bachelor's degree in business administration from UNC-Wilmington. She has a certificate of corporate citizenship from Boston College Carroll School of Management, is the current president of the Junior League of Wilmington and has served on the program committee for the annual meeting of the NC Network of Grantmakers.

NCCF CEO Jennifer Tolle Whiteside noted that these positions are key to the organization's mission to ensure that philanthropy is available throughout the state, with a focus on rural areas. "Without the position of regional director, we could not carry out our work across the state," she said.
