WGN Awards \$67K in 2016

he nine-person Grants Committee has been hard at work since May to ensure the most deserving organizations that serve women and children in Wake County are passed along to membership for a vote in October. Our fair, efficient and non-emotional process is one that has evolved over the years, and it is a good one!

In May we received 38 letters of intent (LOI's) from local organizations. Every committee member read through, studied and scored each LOI individually. At our meeting in June, the committee narrowed the 38 organizations down to 15. This is no small feat!

We then asked these possible grantees to provide full grant applications. Our committee members are now in the process of evaluating these applications. When we met at the beginning of September, we reviewed the scores and narrow down the number to nine organizations for site visits. After these site visits, we will have a comprehensive picture of each project and each organization. Then we will select four to five of the best choices to pass along to YOU for a vote in late October.

Please take advantage of the numerous hours of work by our Grants Committee, read about the organizations we recommend and VOTE! Last year we granted \$67,600 to well deserving non-profits.

Our 2016 grantees:

• A Lotta Love — provided funding to refurnish and and redecorated Wrenn House, the only homeless, runaway and crisis intervention program and shelter for children in the Triangle. The newly-designed space is now more home-like, giving these children a clean, safe, happy environment and a sense of hope.

• The Frankie Lemmon School and Development Center — provided a playground for three-year olds with developmental disabilities.

• Transitions Guiding Lights — provided jobless women with scholarships to attain their nurses aide's degree. Nurses-aide experience is a prerequisite to being admitted to nursing school. Nurses aides also provide care for our growing elderly population.

"The money that we received from the Women's Giving Network was used to purchase artificial turf for our new playground," says Frankie Lemmon director Rebecca Smith."The turf is hypoallergenic, easily accessible and meets fall zone requirements for our playground equipment.

"Prior to the construction of the new playground our 3-year-olds with special needs had to use our playground in the back of the school which was not only physically challenging but too far away from their necessary supplies or equipment. Many of our children in the 3-year-old classrooms are learning how to play, participate and move around during outside time and our new playground gives them the opportunity to learn in a safe and accessible environment."

Thank you for trusting the Grants Committee with such an important task. We look forward to the completion of our process so the WGN can learn more about the needs in our county, and in turn, support those needs.

Renovation of Wrenn House, the only homeless, runaway and crisis intervention program and shelter for children in the Triangle. Renovation of this rundown shelter included new living room and dining room spaces, new bedding and lamps for the bedrooms, new towels, toiletries and a chest or armoire for each child to put their belongings, an intake/library and new carpet and paint throughout the house. The new space is warm and inviting, offering hope to children in crisis.





Transitions Guiding Lights

The WGN grant will support full scholarships for low income women to the Nurse Aide (NA1) training program at Transitions Guiding Lights' Caregiver Training Institute.

Guiding Light graduates are much sought after by top employers in institutions of excellence trying to cope with the 'silver tsunami' of older adults. New NA1s help fill the urgent and fast-growing need for well-trained NA1s, particularly those with specialized training in caring for the elderly. While helping strengthen the workforce, students receive strong preparation for future career advancement to match their aspirations.

Frankie Lemmon Center

The Frankie Lemmon School needed a new playground specifically designed, equipped and built for 3-year-old children with special needs. It includes a swing for children with physical disabilities, a climbing structure with multi-sensory aspects, and stateof-the-art child-safe ground cover.

Because of their disabilities, many of the children need to be taught how to play, which is essential to the development of physical, intellectual and social skills. Play becomes therapy. Over the course of 20 years, this playground will serve more than 2,000 children.

Tailor Your Involvement in the WGN

If you'd like to become more involved in our program, consider joining one of our committees. Here's a description of each. The committee holds at least six meetings throughout the year, mostly between May and October. Site visits are conducted during the month of September.

GRANTS COMMITTEE. The Grants Committee is responsible for researching, identifying and nominating projects/ programs for funding and ensuring that the grant-making process is interactive and inclusive. The committee holds several meetings throughout the year.

EDUCATION COMMITTEE. The Education Committee is responsible for providing members with skill-building and informational programs that enhance their effectiveness in giving. The committee holds several committee meetings throughout the year.

SPECIAL EVENTS COMMITTEE. The Special Events Committee is responsible for assisting the Leadership Committee with events throughout the year, including planning for the annual grants luncheon and securing the speaker. The committee holds several meetings throughout the year.

COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE. The Communications Committee is responsible for regular internal and external communications including a newsletter, website updates, press releases, invitation design, and special publications. This committee works closely with the staff of the North Carolina Community Foundation. The committee holds several meetings throughout the year.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE. The Membership Committee is responsible for the recruitment and retention of members and serves to promote the mission, accomplishments and values through social gatherings and networking opportunities. The committee holds several meetings plus three recruitment events throughout the year.
