
<u>The Queen's Foundation</u> - \$25,000 for the Power House project – page 5

A Note From Our President Kella Hatcher



In December at our annual grants luncheon, we celebrated the milestone of contributing to our community over \$1 million in grants since our first grant cycle in 2007. This is no small thing, and each one of you should be proud of the positive impact you are having on your community! Over the years, our grants have funded a variety of projects, and WGN grants have addressed multiple intersecting problems with multiple, intersecting solutions to truly make progress. Here is my illustration of what we do . .

There is a child, we'll call her Sophie, whose mom Jane is struggling to take care of the two of them after fleeing from Sophie's dad who was abusive. We don't just fund an organization that provides help to Sophie and Jane in those early days of escaping the violence, we also fund a nonprofit which helps furnish their new apartment once they begin to settle. We fund an organization that provides a whole season of outfits for Sophie, one that teaches her to read and one that feeds her too. We fund a nonprofit that teaches Jane life skills and another that prepares her for a job interview and puts her in a new suit for the occasion. We fund an organization that enables Sophie to find the joy in music lessons or in a special dance program at school, and one that gives Sophie a safe and enriching place to go after school when Jane is at work. We fund organizations where Sophie and Jane can access health care and another where they can get mental health services.

For Sophie and Jane, there isn't just one fix that will put them on the right path to make it in this world. There isn't just one organization that can meet their many needs. It takes a combination of fixes delivered by a whole village of people. And all of you are a very important part of that village. Whether you are a WGN member who comes to our events, whether you volunteer on our committees, or whether you limit your WGN participation to simply writing a check, you're part of the village. We thank you for your participation, and Sophie and Jane thank you too.

Jill Wolford, a pharmacist by training and graduate of UNC-CH has worked for the last 23 years for GlaxoSmithKline. She has been married for 25 years and is the mother to two children. Jill and her husband Eric, along with the support of friends, started the Caring Community Foundation in their backyard 15 years ago out of a desire to pay it forward after Jill's fight with breast cancer. 


Amber Smith. the founder and Executive Director of Activate Good, leads a nonprofit that activates volunteers to help over 300 charitable causes in the Triangle community. A self-proclaimed "cause nerd," Amber studied social change, leadership, and nonprofit management through undergraduate and Masters programs at NC State University. Her vision is that the Triangle community will rise to become number one in volunteerism in the nation! 2015 Grant Recipients

WGN's top voting award went to The Queen's Foundation, a state-wide nonprofit dedicated to addressing poverty and the education gap in North Carolina by advancing the lives of young women in NC public schools who live in extreme poverty and will be first in their families to earn a four-year college degree. Once a young woman enters the program, she remains in the program for four years until her first completed year of college. Their Power House project is a leadership and college preparation program.

The Green Chair Project addresses an unmet community need of providing comprehensive furniture assistance to families who are working to achieve selfsufficient lifestyles after transitioning from homelessness, crisis or disaster. Since it's founding in 2010, TGCP has furnished more than 1,000 households, served 2,750 individuals and received 25,000 furniture donations from 5,000 community members. Its Sweeter Dreams program grant will help 160 children secure a bed for a good night's sleep, and the program has provided 403 children with beds to date.





The Women's Center of Wake County helps prevent and end homelessness for women and families in our community. WCWC is a multiservices resource center that addresses the challenging issues of poverty and homelessness for single women and women with children. Critical Time Intervention, CTI, is an evidencebased intervention addressing the complexities involved with chronic homelessness and cooccurring behavioral and physical health issues. It helps women obtain safe shelter leading to permanent housing. The WGN grant insures the ability to continue and enhance this program, which serves some of the most vulnerable women in our community.

Kidznotes mission is to change the life trajectory of underserved k-12 students through orchestral training. It provides 10 hours each week of free orchestral music training and instruments to 100 children grades k–3 in partnership with Wake County Public Schools in the lowest income neighborhoods of Southeast Raleigh. Its expansion project will allow Kidznotes to add new students in Raleigh and to add two new school partners in Wake County for the 2016-17 school year.

Details of the 2015 Grant Process

- The Committee reviewed 42 Letters of Inquiry that Wake County nonprofits submitted.
- Following that review, the Committee invited 14 organizations to submit full grant proposals and studied those applications intensely.
- The Committee selected eight of those organizations for site visits and reported their findings back to the full group.

Based on the reports from the site visits, the Committee presented five projects for voting to its full membership in October. We are pleased with the results and expect our grants to strengthen the Wake County community though the impact of our collective giving. Thanks to all who voted and also to those who attended our luncheon.

WGN Committees Need You!

Membership in The Women's Giving Network does not require service on a committee; however, committees are where the "work" of the Network takes shape. All committees need new members! If you are interested in becoming more engaged in the Network, please notify Katie Crumpler at <u>kcrumpler@nccommunityfoundation.org</u>. Areas of interest include:

Membership Committee

Actively recruits and retains members through social gatherings and networking opportunities.

Leadership Committee

Provides the overall direction of the Network and manages the operational affairs of the group. The Leadership Council consists of the president, incoming president, grants chair, membership chair, communications chair, education chair, special events chair, 3-5 additional at-large members and one statewide women's liaison. Atlarge members may be given assignments or projects.







Grants Committee

Develops and implements the formal grants process. This committee meets often, in daytime hours, usually for two hours or more. Homework is involved. Subgroups may be formed to accomplish assignments outside of committee meetings. Committee members must attend 80% of the meetings, and the number of members caps at 15. The committee rotates on a three-year term.

Education Committee

Develops knowledge-building and informational programs that increase our members' knowledge on topics affecting women and children in our county.

Communications Committee

Focuses on communications needs, including a quarterly newsletter, and assists with updating members on Network news between newsletters.

Special Events Committee

Organizes and assists with special events such as the annual grants awards luncheon.
