Calls for Service

Calls for service are generated either by citizen complaints or officers self-initiating. These calls range from a request for a vehicle unlock, to a suspicious person, to a traffic stop, to more serious criminal matters with all requiring the presence or response of an officer to resolve, correct or assist in that situation.

In May 2023 the Wendell Police Department recorded 461 calls for service as compared to 386 in the same month the previous year.

*Above "Top Five" tables do not include self-initiated calls such as foot patrol, school crossing or security checks, however those calls are included in the total monthly calls for service reported in the second paragraph of this section.

Response Time

One of the goals of the Police Department as identified in the Town's Strategic Plan and Budgetary Documents is to continue to provide core police services of community patrol and response to emergency and non-emergency calls at current levels. A critical component of this goal is to maintain an 90th percentile response time from time dispatched until on scene of 7 minutes. The 90th percentile response time is that time for which 90% of the response times are less and 10% are longer.

The 90th percentile response time for this month is 6.9 minutes.

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Incident Reports Files

Incident reports are typically generated for actual reported crime and capture the necessary information to conduct an investigation. In some cases, they are informational only when needed to document future potential issues or property not associated with a crime.

In May 2023 the Wendell Police Department filed 57 incident reports as compared to 40 in the same month the previous year. A summary of the crimes reported in these incidents is summarized in the following section.

Motor Vehicle Crash

Motor vehicle crashes reported here include collisions in which a vehicle collides with another vehicle, pedestrian, animal, road debris, or other stationary obstruction, such as a tree, pole or building. The crashes here include those which are reported to the North Carolina Department of Motor Vehicles.

In May 2023 the Wendell Police Department filed 21 motor vehicle crash reports as compared to 12 in the same month the previous year.

Directed Efforts

Officers conducted strategic traffic enforcement in areas where we have received previous traffic complaints:

Community Engagement Efforts

On May 22nd and 23rd Sgt. McGhee's Squad participated in Cardinal Charter Academy's Public Safety Day. Over the two days they were able to engage with 682 Students in grades K-8.

On May 6th the Wendell Police Department held its annual Public Safety Day. The weather held off and it was as great day for the department and other public safety entities to interact with our community.

On May 15th Chief Carter represented our community at the Wake County Law Enforcement Memorial event held in Raleigh. This event honors fallen officers from Wake County.

Administrative Activities

Captain Slaughter conducted Implicit Bias and All Hazards Training for all police department personnel. Implicit Bias training covered the agency's policy on Bias Based Policing and provided ways to recognize biases. The All-Hazards training covered the agencies All Hazards plan, specifically the Incident Command system.

Sgt. Hanks attended Master Taser Instructor Training to further is Taser Instructor training. This training provides more in-depth training on the Taser 7 and with the Master Taser Instructor certification, Sgt. Hanks can train and certify other Taser Instructors.
