#### SOAR

#### (Savings, Opportunities, Assets, Results)

The United Way SOAR Collaborative<sup>1</sup> — a community-wide public, private, faith-based partnership — serves a critical need of promoting self-sufficiency among low-to-moderate income populations in Central Texas. UWCT has established strategic partnerships with community partners and its financial institution partner, Extraco Banks, to provide low-income households accounts into which they can deposit some of their earnings to save for the acquisition of an asset. The money saved will then be matched 8:1 and can be withdrawn for buying a home or paying for higher education. Participants also complete a financial literacy curriculum.

- 27 open SOAR accounts
- 17 Home-saver accounts
  - 5 accounts met their savings goal and purchased their first home in 2017
- 10 Postsecondary education accounts
  - 3 accounts met their savings goal, and paid for tuition, books, and furthered their education in 2017
- Over \$17,100 combined saved dollars across all open accounts

#### VITA (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance)

The UWCT VITA<sup>2</sup> (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance) program prepared 968 free tax returns for Central Texans with low-to-moderate incomes, persons with disabilities, the elderly, and those having limited English proficiency. IRS certified VITA volunteers provided basic income tax return services without charge, ensuring 100% of the tax refund went directly to the customer.

The average Adjusted Gross Income of taxpayers served was \$24,000. Over \$1.4 million in refunds and \$468,475 in Earned Income Tax Credits (EITC) were returned to people living in the local community. EITCs can supplement a working, low-income individual or family's income by 20-30%; lifting more working families out of poverty.

### BRIDGES TO WELLNESS & HEALTH

BridgeS to Wellness & Health is a collaborative strategy between Baylor Scott & White Health, the United Way of Central Texas, the Temple Community Clinic, and the Body of Christ Clinic. BridgeS to Wellness & Health works with underinsured and uninsured clients who are unable to afford the necessary prescriptions, equipment, transportation, and supplies to maintain or improve their health status. The goal is to 'bridge the gap' while a client awaits approval for long-term affordable prescription coverage. For high-risk patients, the inability to afford prescriptions results in poor health outcomes, increased rates of hospitalization/rehospitalization, and extreme financial burden.

#### **Top 3 Medical Needs:**

- · Sleep Apnea related machines
- Diabetic insulin and supplies
- COPD medical supplies

In 2017, UWCT partnered with the Baylor Scott & White Health Mobile Integrated Health team by purchasing pill-minders and digital scales for high-risk heart failure patients. The goal is to help these patients lower the risk of hospital readmittance.



# HEALTH INSURANCE MARKETPLACE Education and Enrollment

UWCT takes an active role in ensuring Central Texans have access to healthcare. Through a federal grant awarded to a regional consortium, the United Way of Central Texas employs Health Insurance Marketplace Navigators<sup>1</sup>. Navigators are state and federally certified to provide unbiased information and assistance to individuals, families, and small businesses. They are local resources for enrollment into qualified health plans in the Marketplace, and public programs including Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program. Navigators help those who qualify for lower costs gain access through the Advanced Premium Tax Credit and Cost Share Reduction programs. In addition, navigators have a broad knowledge of local programs and can provide referrals to those unable to qualify for Marketplace programs.



#### NAVIGATOR DATA 2017

- 112 families enrolled into qualified health plans
- 378 phone calls received from clients inquiring about the Health Insurance Marketplace
- 45 clients increased their health insurance literacy
- Helped 35 clients locate providers and/or verify their physician is covered through their insurance
- 18 children enrolled into CHIP/Children's Medicaid

#### **HOMETOWN HUDDLE**

United Way of Central Texas held the third Annual Hometown Huddle at the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor Crusader Stadium. Boys and girls, aged 7 to 12-years-old, participated in non-contact sports drills led by Titan Total Training coaches. Participants learned about the importance of playing for 60 minutes a day and fighting childhood obesity.

Attendees had a meet-and-greet with NFL Chicago Bears linebacker and UMHB Alumnus, Jerrell Freeman, and the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor Division III National Champions football team.

"I am proud to support United Way of Central Texas Hometown Huddle," Freeman said. "The goal of Hometown Huddle is to promote youth fitness and to show kids that working out for 60 minutes a day can be fun."




### 2-1-1: FREE INFORMATION AND REFERRAL 24/7

2-1-1, a program of the Texas Health and Human Services Commission, is committed to helping Texas citizens connect with the services they need. 2-1-1 has provided information and referrals to more than **90,000** callers since taking over the call center in 2015. The most requested needs in 2017 were electric service assistance, rental assistance, and food pantries. Of the **48,550** calls received in 2017, over **5,600** were from seniors (65+), and over **8,600** were related to Hurricane Harvey. 2-1-1 also helps active duty and military veterans and their families by assessing the needs of people who inquire about veteran services and providing information about local programs.

#### **EDUCATION**

#### Early Education

- Permanent funding for pre-kindergarten program established by HB 4 that emphasizes quality such as full-day, ratios, and parent engagement
- Support for programs that strengthen the successful transition from early learning through elementary school
- Promising and/or evidence-based practices, like home visitation, that build school readiness, engage parents, and support teachers and schools

#### Student Success and Career Preparation

- Incentivize public/private partnerships that support students and families in their career decisions and pathways
- Incentivize companies to offer paid internships, externships, job shadowing, and apprenticeships for high school students and beyond
- Support for opportunities that ensure students successful transition through middle/high school and post-secondary learning and into careers

#### FINANCIAL STABILITY

#### Increasing Income and Building Assets

- Support initiatives that build financial capability and assets of low-to-moderate individuals and families
- Incentivize communities to develop industry-led partnerships that build skills with paid internships that link individuals to career pathways
- Encourage policies that improve access to affordable credit and help build credit scores
- Support policies that foster responsible lending practices including statewide payday/auto-title lending regulation

#### Child Abuse and Neglect

- Increased funds for promising and/or evidence-based practices that reduce abuse and neglect such as home visitation
- Significantly increase funding and support for children in foster care such as mental health services, human resources, and other infrastructure needs that impact the quality of life for children in care
- Support strategies that result in successful transition of youth aging out of foster care into successful, independent opportunities

- Adequate mental health resources for under-served, high-need populations

#### VOLUNTEER THROUGHOUT THE YEAR

During Tax season (February - April) VITA volunteers provide free income tax preparation to qualifying individuals. On Dr. Seuss's birthday (March 2nd) volunteers sign up to read to elementary school students. UWCT partners with companies to provide volunteer experiences with companies throughout the year including school supply drives, summer fan drives, hygiene supply drives and much, much more.


