We continue to strategically invest your dollars in the most effective programs, making critical connections, and creating lasting solutions in peoples lives. Because we strive to maximize the impact in the community, we have incorporated a number of best practices into our investment process. One such practice, the implementation of the Results Based Accountability framework, helps us collect more detailed data around program outcomes. We are able to evaluate the quality of our impact as well as the quantity, giving us better insight into the effectiveness of our investments.

We have an even larger focus on community partnerships between organizations that share a mission of serving our community in the areas of health, education, and financial stability. You will read in this report about new partnerships with the Scott & White Health Plan to connect at-risk clients with critical resources. Workforce Solutions of Central Texas and the United Way have joined together to create a Shared Services Alliance that will provide valuable resources to our early child care learning centers so that we can ensure every child is school-ready and reading by 3rd grade.

The United Way of Central Texas is fortunate to have a strong foundation of leaders and members of the community who not only invest dollars, but time to make a lasting impact. This generosity of spirit is inspiring and has made a difference in the lives of our neighbors.

As you read through this annual report, I ask that you feel proud of your efforts that made these positive outcomes possible. Change does not happen alone and you have made a difference.

BOLD - BUILDING OPPORTUNITIES for LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

UWCT knows that to effect change involves bringing together people, agencies, and businesses to work towards common goals. Through monthly BOLD meetings, the United Way of Central Texas brings agency and community leadership together for trainings, facilitated discussions, and information sharing.

BOLD HIGHLIGHTS

Agency and Community Leaders come together to discuss community needs, opportunities, potential collaborations, and program best practices.

AGENCY SPOTLIGHTS

Monthly BOLD meetings often highlight a specific agency or program within the community. This increases local awareness of the work each agency is doing, builds stronger relationships between agencies, facilitates collaboration, and aids in making appropriate client referrals.

TRAININGS

United Way of Central Texas believes in finding lasting solutions to change people's lives. As a foundation of this practice, BOLD meetings include trainings on using data to evaluate program successes, collaboration, and nonprofit best-practices.

AGENCY ANNOUNCEMENTS

BOLD meetings provide a forum where agencies can talk about upcoming events, fundraisers, and collaborations to spread awareness and opportunities to share.

ALICE - Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed

ALICE, an acronym which stands for **A**sset **L**imited, **I**ncome **C**onstrained, **E**mployed, represents the growing number of individuals and families who are working, but are unable to afford the basic necessities of housing, food, child care, health care, and transportation.

Why ALICE Matters

The United Way of Central Texas partnered with the United Ways of Texas to launch ALICE in Texas in January, 2019 by connecting an ALICE family from Temple who has successfully participated in several financial stability programs at the UWCT and was able to share their story to provide advice and encouragement to others struggling to make household ends meet.

EDUCATION HIGHLIGHTS

UWCT is proud to support the Temple ISD **Wildcat Mentor Program**. Research confirms that quality mentoring relationships have powerful positive effects on young people in a variety of personal, academic, and professional situations.

SHARED SERVICES ALLIANCE

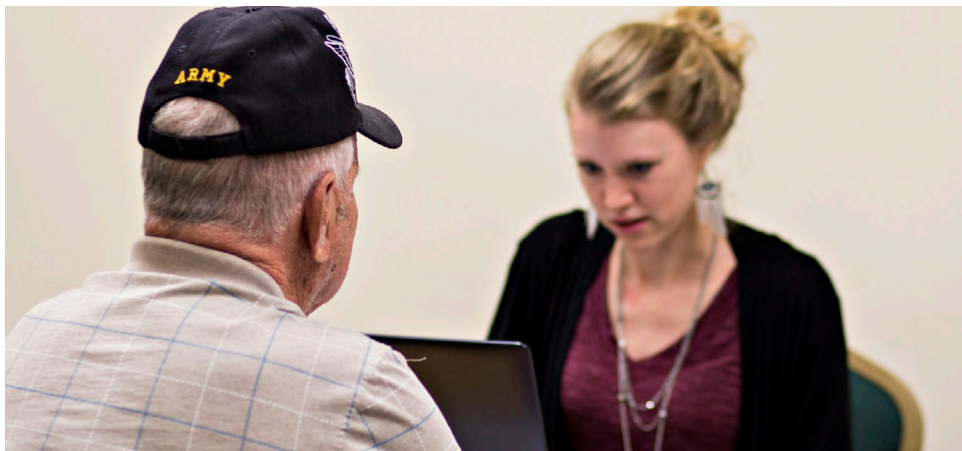
Together with **Workforce Solutions of Central Texas**, we are establishing a Shared Services Alliance, a grant initiative that focuses on strengthening early child care provider services, so they can become better able to deliver high-quality child care that leads to school-ready students who will excel and become valuable members of our future workforce.

SCHOOL SUPPLY DRIVES

During the summer months before a new school year begins, UWCT partners up with local businesses for school supply drives. In 2018, we collected supplies to help students in kindergarten through 12th grade. Partners included McLane Company, Don Ringler Chevrolet, and community volunteers. Supplies were distributed throughout Temple ISD schools.

CELEBRATING DR. SEUSS DAY

National Read Across America Day is an annual reading, motivation, and awareness effort that calls for every child to celebrate reading on March 2nd, the birthday of children's author, Dr. Seuss. Volunteers sign up to read at Temple ISD and Belton ISD elementary schools.

FINANCIAL STABILITY - EARN WELL

UWCT focuses on lasting income solutions to help people build skills and education necessary to get, keep, and advance in a good job. UWCT engages in strategic partnerships from all sectors to offer financial wellness, coaching, and planning to help anyone better manage income, savings, and assets.

FINANCIAL STABILITY HIGHLIGHTS

UWCT partnered with United Ways of Texas to launch **ALICE** in Texas in January, 2019. ALICE (Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed) represents the growing number of individuals and families who are working, but are unable to afford the basic necessities of housing, food, child care, health care, and transportation.

SOAR - Savings, Opportunities, Assets, Results

The **Savings, Opportunities, Assets, Results (SOAR)** collaborative¹ helps clients reach their savings goals to purchase a first time home, or attend post secondary education.

¹This UWCT program is funded in part through a grant from BBVA Compass Foundation and through a grant from the US Department of Health & Human Services Assets for Independence Program.

VITA - Volunteer Income Tax Assistance

In 2018, UWCT received a federal **VITA**² grant, allowing the program to expand, with tax sites located in Temple, Belton, Killeen, Harker Heights, and rural areas of Hamilton and Goldthwaite through the implementation of virtual tax sites.

HEALTH - LIVE WELL

UWCT, with the help of strategic partnerships, is addressing the issue of health care access with a variety of strategies, including connecting people to health services through free clinics and financial assistance for prescription drugs and medical equipment.

HEALTH HIGHLIGHTS

The annual **Hometown Huddle** event promotes healthy habits for boys and girls aged 7 -12. Titan Total Training coaches set up non-contact sports drills at the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor, where kids have the opportunity to interact with D3 championship football players, and an NFL meet-and-greet with Jerrell Freeman (Chicago Bears linebacker and UMHB alumnus).

BRIDGES TO WELLNESS & HEALTH

In 2018, the **BridgeS to Wellness & Health** program helped over 170 clients receive necessary prescriptions and medical equipment they otherwise could not afford. The program has helped over 700 clients since its inception in 2015. BridgeS to Wellness & Health partners with Baylor Scott & White Health to assist underinsured and uninsured clients who are unable to afford necessary prescriptions, equipment, and transportation.

COMMUNITY HUB

Community Hub is a cooperative program with Scott and White Health Plan to remove barriers to quality health care and address social determinants of health-economic and social situations that affect health status. Case managers identify and connect patients to resources relating to housing, food, child/eldercare, transportation, utilities, employment, family/community support, birth certificates, home modifications, and other needs.



2-1-1 HELPLINE

The United Way of Central Texas 2-1-1¹ HELPLINE is free and confidential, and available 24 hours, 365 days a year. The helpline is staffed by trained specialists who can find real answers for callers as they work the most comprehensive social services database in the state of Texas.

¹2-1-1 Texas is a program of the Texas Health and Human Services Commission in collaboration with United Way of Central Texas.

In 2018, our 2-1-1 HELPLINE call specialists assisted over 42,600 callers in our seven county region.

Over 1,750 callers were active duty or military veterans.

The top 5 requested needs in 2018 were electric payment assistance, rent payment assistance, food pantry services, water service payment assistance, and homeless shelter locations.

Over 3,650 calls were from senior citizens aged 65 and older. Over 120 of these calls were from individuals over the age of 90.

The top 3 agency referrals in Bell County were to St. Vincent de Paul of Temple, The Salvation Army of Temple, and Bell County Human Services.

ADVOCACY

UWCT believes that active participation in policy is critical, not just to further the impact of our work, but to drive lasting systemic change. UWCT works with the United Ways of Texas to support a legislative agenda that supports priorities in health, education, and financial stability.

Payday and Auto-Title Loans Hurt Families & Communities

Meet David. David took out a \$1,000 Auto Title Loan in December, 2018 at Lone Star Title Loans in Temple, Texas in response to a family crisis. He left that day with \$900 (LST kept \$100 off the top for a processing fee). David has now paid over \$2,241 with an interest rate of 383% for his original \$1,000 loan and still owes \$592. He will have to re-finance the \$592 and start over again. The United Way of Central Texas, along with their partners, continue to advocate for the protection of local payday/auto title lending ordinances from being preempted and consumer protections from predatory lending.

Effects of Payday & Auto-Title Loans on Texas Veterans

The United Way of Central Texas partnered with Texas Appleseed, United Way of Greater Houston, and Mission United in Houston to expose the harmful impact of payday and auto-title loans on Texas Veterans. These loans are exacerbating financial hardships for Texas veterans and their families. The United Way of Central Texas, along with their partners, advocate for Texas leaders to take action to rein in abuses and establish a baseline of fair market practices to enhance the financial well-being of our veterans and of all Texas families.

VOLUNTEER

UWCT strives to provide volunteer projects that are meaningful to both the volunteers and the recipients of volunteer work. UWCT partners with companies to provide volunteer experiences throughout the year including school supply drives, summer fan drives, hygiene supply drives, and more.

DAY OF CARING

Over 400 volunteers joined us on the annual on **Day of Caring** in 2018. Day of Caring is a strategic volunteer program created to help advance the common good on issues of education, financial stability, and health.

CHROME & CAROLS

UWCT kicks off the holiday season with the **Annual Chrome & Carols Festival of Trees** fundraiser in December. Trees are raffled off throughout the night along with a silent and live auction. Volunteers that serve on the Chrome & Carols Committee help raise more than \$45,000 every year to be invested in UWCT initiatives and programs.

SUMMER FAN DRIVE

Gearing up for the hot summer months, UWCT partners with local businesses to run a **Summer Fan Drive**. Volunteers help run the event (held over multiple days at different locations). Community members donate new, un-opened fans which are distributed to agencies who then distribute the fans to clients in need.

COMMUNITY INVESTMENT PROCESS

The United Way Citizens Review Committee - comprised of community leaders, volunteers, and donors - spends two months reviewing agency requests. Volunteers complete a thorough application review and agency interview to evaluate the measurable impact of each program and provide data-driven funding recommendations to the Board of Directors.

HOW WE TACKLE THE ISSUES

Volunteers lift up our neighbors and the community through ongoing volunteer projects creating impact. Our online volunteer portal makes it easier than ever to match volunteers to projects in our community.

Annual campaign and grants fuel our work. In 2018-19, contributions topped \$1.5 million into programs and initiatives advancing the common good. An undesignated contribution to the Community Impact Fund is the most effective way to support the whole community; helping people learn more, earn more, and lead safe and healthy lives.
