

Executive Summary

Community Health Assessment Overview

The Community Health Assessment (CHA) provides the basis for improving and supporting the health of people in a community. The State of North Carolina requires that each county produces a Community Health Assessment document (CHA) every four years. The last CHA in Franklin County was conducted in 2011. One of the purposes of conducting a new CHA is to identify new priority health issues for Franklin County for the next four years.



Based upon findings, steps have been developed to implement interventions, as well as, community resources to address these health issues. The Community Health Assessment team is comprised of many participants representing area agencies in Franklin County, North Carolina. During monthly meetings, standards for the Community Health Assessment Process and Accreditation were discussed and reviewed for publication in the 2015 Community Health Assessment. Each member reviewed and approved of the Community Health Assessment Survey and Community Resource Directory included in the assessment. After the analysis was completed, of 387 surveys using Survey Monkey, qualitative and quantitative data findings were presented to the Community Health Assessment team. The team reviewed the data and developed the top ten major health issues based upon statistical data and community survey results.

Prioritizing Health Concerns

During the months of October through November 2015, a community-wide survey was conducted to give residents an opportunity to express concerns and opinions about the quality of life in Franklin County. Franklin County's self-administered survey included questions about the quality of life, economy, education, environment, health, housing, leisure activities, safety, social issues, transportation, and emergency preparedness. Surveys were distributed strategically across the county in an effort to reach a wide variety of the population. A total of **387 surveys** were included in the final analysis. Based on findings from the community survey combined with secondary health data, in November 2015, Franklin County Community Health Assessment Team identified ten (10) top health concerns for the county.

The top ten health concerns are as follows:

1. Chronic Disease (Cancer, Diabetes, Heart Disease)
2. Drug/Alcohol Abuse
3. Obesity
4. Tobacco Use
5. Asthma
6. Mental Health
7. Other
8. Gangs//Violence
9. Teen Pregnancy
10. Vehicle Crashes



The Franklin County Community Health Assessment Team participated in a prioritization activity to determine the two leading health concerns to be addressed during 2015-2019. The worksheet asked that each of the ten concerns be ranked according to three criteria: Magnitude of the Problem, Seriousness of the Consequences, and Feasibility of Correcting the Problem. During the Community Health Assessment Team meeting, the results from the prioritization process are reviewed and discussed. The final health concerns are named as the focus for the next four-year cycle, 2015-2019.

Due to the results of the worksheets, the 2015-2019 top two health priorities were identified as the following:

1. Chronic Disease: Diseases of the Heart
2. Physical Activity and Nutrition: Obesity

The health priority areas have been set for the CHA team members to create action plans by September 2, 2016 for implementation. A presentation was given at the Board of Health meeting, March 8, 2016 to present the 2015 Community Health Assessment and health priority areas. The 2015 Community Health Assessment is available at www.franklincohealth.org, onsite at the health department, public libraries, clinics, and schools. A presentation of the 2015 Community Health Assessment is available upon request by the health educator at Franklin County Health Department.

Franklin County Background

Franklin County is a rural county in the Piedmont region of North Carolina, located just 21 miles northeast of the state capital of Raleigh. The county covers 494 square miles and consists of five municipalities: Bunn, Centerville, Franklinton, Youngsville, and Louisburg, which is the county seat. The county is bordered by Granville, Vance, and Warren Counties on the north, Nash County on the east, and Wake County on the south. According to the 2010 United States Census, the total population of Franklin County was 60,619. The 2010-2014 median family income was \$42,763, and the unemployment rate in Franklin County at the end of the first quarter of 2011 was 10 %.

Historical Overview

Located in the northeast Piedmont region of North Carolina, and formed in the midst of the American Revolutionary War, Franklin County was carved out of the abolished Bute County and established in 1779. The county's name is attributed to Benjamin Franklin, a politician, statesman, and iconic founding father of the United States.

Although many times overshadowed by its neighbor, Wake County, Franklin County has significant destinations and has played a role in North Carolina's economic history. The

county seat, Louisburg, is named in honor of King Louis XVI. Within its borders in 1805, the first junior college in the United States, now called Louisburg College, was founded. The Person Place, a restored eighteenth-century home in Louisburg, attracts many tourists. Within Franklinton, a small town in the western Franklin County, an example of North Carolina's scientific inquiry and technology exists: Novozymes North America Inc. plant, the largest multi-purpose enzyme manufacturing plant in the nation. Other important communities are Bunn, Centerville, and Youngsville.

A few historical notables and famous athletes have called Franklin County home. Thomas B. W. Bickett, the 54th Governor of North Carolina, lived in Louisburg for some time. Franklinton (population just under 2,000) has produced more famous athletes than many areas significantly larger. Boxer Jack Johnson, basketball player Henry Bibby, baseball players Jim Bibby (brother to Henry) and Wilbur Wade Card, and NFL player Wilmont Perry all hail from the small town. Other natives include U.S. Diplomat Moses A. Hopkins and country music singer Jason Michael Carroll.

Franklin County has many of the rolling hills that grace the North Carolina Piedmont countryside, but the Tar River also runs through it and provides an even more picturesque setting while providing a formerly important transportation route for the area's agricultural, lumber, and textile industries. For its scenery, Franklin County has, in some ways, become a bedroom community as people commute to neighboring Wake County, Raleigh, or Research Triangle Park to work. 

In 2014, North Carolina’s total population was 9,943,964, an increase of 4.3 percent since 2010. The 2014 estimate total population for Franklin County residents is 62,860, a 3.7 percent increase from 2010 which was at 60,619. Of that number, the population can be broken down in the following percentages: 26.8 percent are African American; 69.8 percent are White; 0.9 percent are American Indian; 8.0 percent are Hispanic; 1.8 percent are two or more races combined; and 0.6 percent are Asian. Survey results accounted for 26.8 percent African American and 69.8% white. 50.4 percent of the County’s population is female, and 49.6 percent is male. (US Census Bureau, 2014)



Determinants of Health

Social Environment and Economic Issues

Education and Schools

From 2010-2014, residents over 25 years of age totaled 41,831. Of that segment of the population, 6.0 percent had less than ninth grade education (State 4.8 percent); 12.4% completed ninth through twelfth grade/no diploma (State: 8.1 percent); 32.5 percent were high school graduates or had completed high school equivalency exams (State: 25.8 percent); 20.9 percent had completed some college (State: 22.8 percent); 10.0 percent had an associate's degree (State: 10 percent); 12.8 percent had a bachelor's degree (State: 18.8 percent); and 5.4 percent had a Master's, professional, or doctorate degree (State: 9.5 percent). (US Census 2010-2014)

According to survey respondents, 27.2 percent have a high school diploma, 17.3 percent have a bachelor's degree, 23.8 percent have some college, and 6.85 % have a graduate or professional degree.

Franklin County Schools is comprised of 16 schools and serves more than 8,500 students from the communities within Franklin County. Crosscreek Charter School serving grades K-8 is the only charter school in the county. The following is a chart of schools located in Franklin County.

Franklin County School's total number of dropouts were 79, at a rate of 1.97 per 1,000, which is a decrease from 2012-2013 school year at a rate of 2.92 per 1,000. 

Local College Enrollment


Vance Granville Community College

The North Carolina General Assembly founded Vance-Granville Community College (VGCC) as Vance County Technical Institute in 1969. Located midway between Henderson and Oxford alongside Interstate 85, the new campus consisting of four buildings opened in August 1976, just six weeks after the Legislature granted community college status, and its name was changed to Vance-Granville Community College. The College experienced such rapid growth that a fifth building was added in 1978, while the College service area was expanded to include Franklin County and a major portion of Warren County (VGCC was assigned responsibility for all of Warren County by the North Carolina Board of Community Colleges in 2001). VGCC offers more than 40 curriculum programs, in which students work toward certificates, diplomas and degrees. Area residents and businesses can also take advantage of a variety of Continuing Education opportunities, including the High School Equivalency and Adult High School Diploma programs. High school students can also get a step ahead by starting their college education early with VGCC courses.

VGCC Enrollment for Fall Semester 2014




Vance Granville Community College-Student Race/Ethnicity

Louisburg College


At the beginning of the twentieth century, a number of significant changes took place. The institution became known as Louisburg College, and the college became officially linked to the Methodist Church. Washington Duke, Durham philanthropist, had acquired ownership of the college property in the 1890s; after his death, his son Benjamin N. Duke presented the property (1907-1909) to the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church.

Louisburg College is the only two-year residential college in North Carolina. At Louisburg, students are given an opportunity to excel in the classroom, and within the campus community. Our students are a part of a learning community where faculty and staff enthusiastically offer the support they need to discover their path in life and reach their full potential. Louisburg College is fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges, and has comprehensive transfer agreements with many public and private colleges and universities, including the sixteen branches of the University of North Carolina system, allowing Louisburg College graduates to make a seamless transition upon entering four-year schools as full-fledged juniors.





Attendance Status

Fall 2014




Household and Ownership Rates

From 2009-2013, there was an average of 23,313 households in Franklin County. The average household size is 2.5 people. The average median value of owner- occupied housing units in Franklin County was \$123,300 from 2009-2013, compared to the North Carolina average of \$153,600. (2014 US Census Bureau)


Income and Poverty Levels

The percentage of individuals living below the poverty level in Franklin County (2010- 2014) was 16.10 percent, below the state at 17.5 percent. Franklin County’s percentage of individuals living in poverty compared to peer county, Nash, which is at 17%, and above the state poverty rate and higher than Franklin County. (2014 Census Bureau)



Income

Franklin County’s average median household income from 2009-2013 was \$41,696 and the state of North Carolina’s was \$46,334. The median household income from 2009-2013 for peer counties includes Nash at \$43,084. Franklin and Nash Counties have median household incomes below the state average. 25% of survey respondents make between \$30,000-49,999 and 13% make less than 10,000 per year. (2014 Census Bureau)




Labor Force

The average weekly wage for Franklin County is \$740.00 The top ten largest employers in order are Franklin County Board of Education (1000+ employees), Novozymes North America (500-999 employees), County of Franklin (500-999 employees), Wal-Mart Associates Inc. (100-249 employees), NC Department of Public Safety (100-249 employees), Captive-Aire Systems Inc. (100-249 employees), Majestic Marble & Glass Co (A Corp) (100-249 employees), Food Lion (100-249 employees), Franklin Memorial Hospital (Novant) (100-249 employees), and Sirchie Finger Print Laboratories (100-249 employees).

29,247 residents are considered part of the workforce, and 1,608 were unemployed. The unemployment rate in 2010 was at 5.9 percent compared to North Carolina

unemployment rate of 9.6 percent. The unemployment rate in 2015 for Nash County is at 6.10% Franklin County’s unemployment rate is lower than the peer county. According to the survey respondents, 4.6 % are unemployed. (US Department of Labor, 2015)

Access to healthcare providers has become an increasing issue for Franklin County residents. Franklin County when compared to its peer, Nash County, has on less health care providers per 10,000 population. The barriers to access to healthcare are related to the number of healthcare providers located within Franklin County. Many citizens have little or no transportation to and from surrounding counties to receive quality of care. Another barrier to access to health care was identified in the 2015 Community Health Assessment surveys where 56.4 percent explained lack of insurance or unable to pay for doctor’s visit is the main reason that keeps people from seeking medical treatment.

Satisfaction with Healthcare

According to the 2015 Community Health Opinion Survey, 89.2 percent of the survey respondents currently have health insurance in Franklin County. From 2010-2014, an average of 80.7 percent of Franklin County residents' has health coverage, lower than Nash County, which has 82.3 percent of Nash County residents with healthcare 2010-2014. (US Census Bureau)

Hospitals

Novant Franklin Regional Hospital closed October of 2015, therefore, leaving Franklin County without a hospital in the county. During the time of operation, Novant Franklin Regional Hospital served residents of Franklin and nearby counties. The closing of the hospital leaves many residents without access to local emergency and surgical services.

Health Status

According to the 2014 BRFSS results, when asked "What would you say that in general your health is?" 19.6 percent of the total respondents in Piedmont North Carolina were in excellent health, compared to 19.0 percent of North Carolina respondents. 32.8 percent of Piedmont North Carolina respondents were in very good health, compared to 31.7 percent NC, 30.1 percent of Piedmont North Carolina were in good health compared to 30.4 percent of North Carolina, 12.7 percent of Piedmont North Carolina were in fair health compared to 13.5 percent North Carolina, and 4.8 percent of Piedmont North Carolina were in poor health compared to 5.5 percent North Carolina. In conclusion, over 60 percent of Piedmont North Carolina thought they were in very good to good health status compared to 69 percent of Community Health Assessment survey respondents. (Data is not available by county.)

Mental Health

According to the BRFSS results, when asked "Now thinking about your mental health, which includes stress, depression, and problems with emotions, for how many days during the past 30 days was your mental health not good?" 68.7 percent of Piedmont North Carolina responded no days, compared to 68.8 percent of North Carolina. 7.2 percent of Piedmont North Carolina responded to having at least 1-2 days, 7.2 percent North Carolina; 10.4 percent of Piedmont North Carolina had 3-7 days, 7.7 percent of North Carolina; 7.7 percent of Piedmont North Carolina had 8-29 days, 8.4 percent of North Carolina; 5.9 percent of Piedmont North Carolina had over 30 days, compared to 6.1 percent of North Carolina. Just over 3 percent of Franklin County citizens' surveyed felt mental health was a concern to their family. 7.5 percent of Franklin County citizens surveyed have been told by a doctor they have a form of depression.

Health Data

Mortality Data

- 530 deaths among Franklin County residents in 2014
- Leading causes of death are heart disease, cancer, cerebrovascular disease (stroke), chronic lower respiratory disease, and diabetes.

- Franklin County Mortality Rates for heart disease, kidney diseases, and cerebrovascular disease are higher than the state rates. Since 2011, the number of heart disease deaths have increased by 2.5 percent, chronic lower respiratory diseases decreased by 1.8 percent, and the number of cancer deaths decreased by 3.9 percent.
- Franklin County Mortality Rates for Heart Disease are lower than Nash County's heart disease mortality rates.
- Franklin County Mortality Rates for Diabetes is equivalent to the state at 3.2 percent.

Physical Activity

The lack of physical activity is a growing concern in Piedmont North Carolina and Franklin County. According to the Community Health Assessment survey findings, just over 16 percent of respondents do not exercise, 42.2 percent exercise one to two days per week, and 27.9 percent exercise 3-5 days per week. Of those surveyed, 39.4 percent felt lack of physical activity was the biggest risk factor that impacts their family. Based on the community survey results and data, physical activity, and nutrition is one of the health priorities selected.

According to the state wide 2014 Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS), Piedmont residents were asked: During the past month, other than your regular job, did you participate in any physical activities or exercises such as running, calisthenics, golf, gardening, or walking for exercise? 







Percentage of Adults who Reported Binge Drinking



Substance Abuse continues to be a health issue for Franklin County. Resources to support rehabilitation are very limited due to the changes in the mental health system and privatized mental health agencies. Many residents face challenges with access to mental providers due to having to transition often or poor follow up. According to those surveyed, 10 percent thought alcohol/drug abuse was the biggest health behavior risk in their family, while 18 percent contributed tobacco use as the biggest risk factor affecting their family. In 2014, the percentage of Piedmont NC current smokers decreased compared to 2013. The percentage of binge drinkers have increased since 2013.

Infant Mortality

The infant mortality rate for Franklin County in 2014 was 10.5 per 1,000 live births, accounting for seven infant deaths in Franklin County. North Carolina’s infant mortality rate was 7.1 per 1,000 live births in 2014 accounting for 860 infant deaths. Nash County and North Carolina, on average, have lower infant death rates compared to Franklin County. Franklin County’s infant mortality rate has increased since 2010. The infant mortality rate in 2010 for Franklin County was 1.5 per 1,000 live births.

Environmental Health Issues

Food and Lodging Inspections

In 2014, a total of 61 restaurants in Franklin County are included with inspection grades. Out of inspections completed 143 received a grade “A” and 9 received a “B”. As of 2011, the County had a total of 6 complaints that were reported and investigated related to restaurant facilities. In 2014, 345 water samples were collected for well and septic inspections.

Lead Testing Results

Franklin County had a higher percentage of children ages 1-2 where blood lead was less or equal to 10 compared to North Carolina and Peer Counties.

Indoor and Outdoor Air Quality

In January 2010, all local restaurants became smoke free in Franklin County. In 2011, Franklin County Health Department became a tobacco free campus. Franklin County Schools have all become smoke free campuses as well. All of Franklin County government grounds are smoke free. The Franklin County Campus of Vance Community College is also tobacco free. Outdoor air quality remains in good to moderate standing for the majority of the year. The air quality during the middle of April and the first of July tends to reach the moderate level, which is acceptable; however, for some pollutants there may be a moderate health concern for a very small number of people who are unusually sensitive to air pollution. During other times throughout the year, the ozone concentrations remained in the green and yellow categories, good to moderate conditions for air quality.

Transportation

According to US Census Bureau, among the occupied housing units in Franklin County 6.3 percent have no vehicles, 26.0 percent have one vehicle, 37.5 percent have two vehicles

available and 30.3 percent have three or more vehicles available. Among the occupied housing units in North Carolina, 6.5 percent have no vehicles, 32.8 percent have one vehicle, 38.6 percent have two vehicles available and 22.1 percent have three or more vehicles available. Over 80 percent of Franklin County residents commute to work utilizing a personal car, compared to 91.3 percent of North Carolina.

Health Disparities

Health Disparities are demonstrable among racial distributions. According to 2014 Census figures, approximately 22.1 percent of North Carolina's population is African American/Black. Franklin County's distribution in 2014 showed that 69.8 percent were Caucasian/White, while 36.3 percent were the minority population consisting of African American 26.8 percent, American Indian and Alaskan Native 0.9 percent, Asian and Hispanic (8.6 percent combined). North Carolina's African Americans are more likely to live in poverty (27 percent) and more likely than whites to have no health insurance (12 percent). Poverty and lack of access to health care are two main reasons North Carolina's African Americans are generally in poorer health than whites and other racial and/or ethnic minorities based on mortality and disease incidence patterns. Due to the demographics of Franklin County and being a rural county, many citizens do not have access to transportation to receive medical care and other services. The only public transportation is via the (KARTS) Kerr Area Transportation Authority. Most of the medical offices are located in Wake County, which can be more than a 30- minute ride from the farthest communities in Franklin County. Employment is a challenge due to transportation issues as the primary businesses and industries are located in Louisburg and Wake County. Several businesses have also closed including the hospital and other healthcare providers; therefore, eliminating job opportunities.

There is limited availability of tertiary centers; Wake Medical Center is about 45 minutes west of Franklin County and Chapel Hill, and Duke Medical are about an hour west of Franklin County. There are many health disparities identified within the three areas of health identified in the 2015 Community Health Assessment:

- Heart Disease
- Physical Activity and Nutrition
- Obesity



### Q1 How do you rate your own health? (check only one)







### Q4 On average, how often do you eat fruits and vegetables? (check only one)



**Q5 On average, how often do you participate in any physical activities/exercises such as running, golf, gardening, or walking for exercise per week?**



### Q27 How many people does your household income support?





### Q29 Do you currently have Health Insurance? If yes, what type?





### Q31 In the past year have you seen a medical provider for any of the following? (check all that apply)



### Q32 Do you use any kind of tobacco products?



### **Prioritizing Health Concerns**

During the months of October through November 2015, a community-wide survey was conducted to give residents an opportunity to express concerns and opinions about the quality of life in Franklin County. Franklin County's self-administered survey included questions about the quality of life, economy, education, environment, health, housing, leisure activities, safety, social issues, transportation, and emergency preparedness. Surveys were distributed strategically across the county in an effort to reach a wide variety of the population. A total of 387 surveys were included in the final analysis. Based on findings from the community survey combined with secondary health data, in November 2015, Franklin County Community Health Assessment Team identified ten (10) top health concerns for the county.

The top ten health concerns are as follows:

1. Chronic Disease (Cancer, Diabetes, Heart Disease)
2. Drug/Alcohol Abuse
3. Obesity
4. Tobacco Use
5. Asthma
6. Mental Health
7. Other
8. Gangs//Violence
9. Teen Pregnancy
10. Vehicle Crashes

The Franklin County Community Health Assessment Team participated in a prioritization activity to determine the two leading health concerns to be addressed during 2015-2019. The worksheet asked that each of the ten concerns be ranked according to three criteria: Magnitude of the Problem, Seriousness of the Consequences, and Feasibility of Correcting the Problem. During the Community Health Assessment Team meeting, the results from the prioritization process are reviewed and discussed. The final health concerns are named as the focus for the next four-year cycle, 2015-2019.

Due to the results of the worksheets, the 2015-2019 top two health priorities were identified as the following:

1. Chronic Disease: Diseases of the Heart
2. Physical Activity and Nutrition: Obesity

The health priority areas have been set for the CHA team members to create action plans by September 2, 2016 for implementation. A presentation was given at the Board of Health meeting, March 8, 2016 to present the 2015 Community Health Assessment and health priority areas. The 2015 Community Health Assessment is available at the health department, public libraries, clinics, hospitals, and schools. A presentation of the 2015 Community Health Assessment is available upon request by the health educator at Franklin County Health Department.

# Guide to Parks



**A GREAT DAY AT THE PARK.** Louisburg College's De Hart Gardens is an exceptional place to spend the day, have a picnic, enjoy the scenery, snap some nature photos and take a short stroll. It is located six miles south of Louisburg on US 401.

Franklin County and its neighboring counties have taken great measures to preserve lands for parks for the enjoyment, recreation and relaxation of residents. Here are some parks located both locally and in surrounding areas:

- **Joyner Park** -- The Town of Louisburg's Joyner Park, on West River Road, encompasses 112 acres and features a regulation-sized soccer field, two picnic shelters, playground area and walking trails.

- **Riverbend Park** -- On the banks of the Tar River in Downtown Louisburg, just off Johnson and Church streets, is where Riverbend Park is located. Grills and picnic areas are on site. The park is a favorite spot for a quick lunch getaway for downtown employees. And there is great fishing off the rocky banks. Call (919) 496-3406 for more information.

- **Franklinton Area County Park** -- Run by the Franklin County Parks and Recreation Department, this facility opened in 2003. At 100 Park Ave., Franklinton, the 25-acre facility boasts a picnic shelter for 140, playground area, baseball and softball fields, a multi-purpose football/soccer field, an all-weather track, trails, wooded area, picnic sites with grills, a sand volleyball court and horse-shoe pits.

We want our valued customers to be informed about their water utility.**

### **What EPA Wants You to Know**

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by *Cryptosporidium* and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. [Name of Utility] is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source water include microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife; inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming; pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff, and residential uses; organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems; and radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health.

### **When You Turn on Your Tap, Consider the Source**

The water that is purchased by Franklin County Public Utilities is provided by the City of Henderson (Kerr Lake, surface water supply) and the Town of Louisburg (Tar River, surface water supply).

## Source Water Assessment Program (SWAP) Results

The North Carolina Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR), Public Water Supply (PWS) Section, Source Water Assessment Program (SWAP) conducted assessments for all drinking water sources across North Carolina. The purpose of the assessments was to determine the susceptibility of each drinking water source (well or surface water intake) to Potential Contaminant Sources (PCSs). The results of the assessment are available in SWAP Assessment Reports that include maps, background information and a relative susceptibility rating of Higher, Moderate or Lower.

The relative susceptibility rating of each source for Franklin County was determined by combining the contaminant rating (number and location of PCSs within the assessment area) and the inherent vulnerability rating (i.e., characteristics or existing conditions of the well or watershed and its delineated assessment area). The assessment findings are summarized in the table below:

The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. **Unless otherwise noted, the data presented in this table is from testing done January 1 through December 31, 2014.** The EPA and the State allow us to monitor for certain contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants are not expected to vary significantly from year to year. Some of the data, though representative of the water quality, is more than one year old.

Unregulated contaminants are those for which EPA has not established drinking water standards. The purpose of unregulated contaminant monitoring is to assist EPA in determining the occurrence of unregulated contaminants in drinking water and whether future regulations are warranted.

## **Important Drinking Water Definitions:**

***Not-Applicable (N/A)*** – Information not applicable/not required for that particular water system or for that particular rule.

***Non-Detects (ND)*** - Laboratory analysis indicates that the contaminant is not present at the level of detection set for the particular methodology used.

***Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/L)*** - One part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

***Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter (ug/L)*** - One part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.

***Parts per trillion (ppt) or Nanograms per liter (nanograms/L)*** - One part per trillion corresponds to one minute in 2,000,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000,000.

***Parts per quadrillion (ppq) or Picograms per liter (picograms/L)*** - One part per quadrillion corresponds to one minute in 2,000,000,000 years or one penny in \$10,000,000,000,000.

***Picocuries per liter (pCi/L)*** - Picocuries per liter is a measure of the radioactivity in water.

***Million Fibers per Liter (MFL)*** - Million fibers per liter is a measure of the presence of asbestos fibers that are longer than 10 micrometers.

***Nephelometric Turbidity Unit (NTU)*** - Nephelometric turbidity unit is a measure of the clarity of water. Turbidity in excess of 5 NTU is just noticeable to the average person.

***Action Level (AL)*** - The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

***Treatment Technique (TT)*** - A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

***Maximum Residual Disinfection Level (MRDL)*** – The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

***Maximum Residual Disinfection Level Goal (MRDLG)*** – The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

***Locational Running Annual Average (LRAA)*** – The average of sample analytical results for samples taken at a particular monitoring location during the previous four calendar quarters under the Stage 2 Disinfectants and Disinfection Byproducts Rule.

***Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL)*** - The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

***Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG)*** - The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.
