I joined the Grants Committee and learned about the needs in Wake County, and the tremendous impact that WGN has made in addressing these needs. The great side benefit has been to meet incredible women who care so deeply about the women and children in our community.

WGN Awards \$89,000 in Grants in 2018

ore than 100 Women's Giving Network of Wake County members and community leaders gathered for the 12th annual Impact Luncheon at the NC State Park Alumni Center on Nov. 8, 2018. During the luncheon, WGN grants chair Molly Painter announced the local grant awards. This year the board granted:

- \$34,000 to the Catholic Charities of the Diocese of Raleigh for the Support Circle Program
- \$10,000 to Kiran, Inc. for the Kiran Empowerment Project

• \$45,000 to The Hope Center at Pullen for strengthening the safety net for young people aging out of foster care in Wake County.

The Impact Luncheon was sponsored by Bank of America and Walter Magazine. WRAL's Debra Morgan served as emcee, and First Lady of North Carolina Kristin Cooper was a special guest. "We were so pleased to be joined by more than 100 WGN members and community leaders for our 12th annual Impact Luncheon," said Laurie Hughes, outgoing president. "It was a wonderful time celebrating our nonprofit grantees and coming together to support collective giving."

The three organizations provide exceptional, critical services in Wake County to women and children.

"Catholic Charities is addressing an incredible need in our community by helping homeless families living in shelters or in hotels find permanent housing through their Support Circle Program," Painter said in her remarks. "This innovative program uses teams of 6-10 people from faith organizations that provide the family support for a year. This includes, mentoring, moving help, goal setting, establishing a budget, providing transportation and access to health and dental care. We applaud the work you're doing."

Kiran, which means 'ray of light' in Hindi, is a non-profit organization that serves and empowers South Asian victims of domestic violence originating from Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Bhutan, India, Maldives, Myanmar (Burma), Nepal, Pakistan, & Sri Lanka.

Circles at Catholic Charities – one of the organizations receiving a grant WGN awarded in 2018. At the end of the meeting, she hugged me and thanked me profusely for our grant. She told me she came in from vacation the week before Christmas to find housing for two families, and she could only do that because of our grant! It is the only nonprofit of its kind addressing domestic abuse within the South Asian community in Wake County.

"Kiran provides culturally-appropriate support services to these South Asian women," Painter said. "Their staff offers a bilingual 24/7 crisis hotline, legal referrals, assistance securing immigration status, and help in obtaining drivers licenses," she said, in addition to other services.

"The Hope Center at Pullen is committed to transforming the lives of young people (ages

18-27) aging out of foster care with wraparound services as they transition into adulthood," Painter said. "Some of these services include help with job readiness, obtaining stable jobs and permanent housing, tutoring and transportation. Hughes also thanked the community for its support of the Women's Giving Network of Wake County. "Thanks to the generosity of our mem-

> bers and sponsors, we were able to launch a Junior Member program this year," she said. "We're proud that this special program encourages women under the age of 40 to join WGN at a reduced rate."Incoming president Hayden Constance thanked WGN's grantees for their critical community work. "We are grateful to every one of our grant applicants and recognize that it was a difficult selection process since we had many well

deserving applications," she said.

"WGN is committed to making a positive impact on the lives of women and children of Wake County through these essential and enhancing programs."

This committee works closely with the staff of the North Carolina Community Foundation.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE. The Membership Committee is responsible for the recruitment and retention of members and serves to promote the mission, accomplishments and values through social gatherings and networking opportunities.
