Greetings from Membership! It is that time of year to renew your membership and help WGN make another great impact on Wake County. As you know, the amount of funds we have to grant organizations supporting women, children, and families in our community each year is directly related to the number of members we have.

We note in the invoice that WGN has made the **decision to move to an annual membership program** rather than requiring a multi-year commitment for membership as was done in the past. The invoice you have received is for a one-year renewal of your membership for this WGN 2021-2022 year, **making you eligible to vote for grantees on this year's slate in October 2022**. Educational Event



On Wednesday, May 11th, the Women's Giving Network hosted its **first**, **post-pandemic 'in-person' Educational Program!** This event featured our second 2021 Grantee: New Leaf Behavioral Health (NLBH) and was graciously hosted by Alliance Medical Ministry, a 2020 WGN grantee. All WGN members and guests attending truly enjoyed visiting with each other, enjoying refreshments prior to the program and meeting our Grantee leaders personally.

NLBH is dedicated to improving the mental health & wellness of all in our community. Its two cofounders Dava Muserallo, Clinical Director and Patrick Malloy, Executive Director, shared compassionate and compelling information. During the conversation, Dava and Patrick played **a heart-breaking and**

heart-warming clip from a 9-year-old who didn't like to eat. After working with an NLBH therapist, her world opened up.

Currently, in their 15th year of operation, Dava and Patrick reported that there has been an **explosion of need for mental health services** in the aftermath of COVID. **Getting funding from WGN was tremendously helpful,** and they thanked us all for the support.



NLBH's vision is for Access to Care. "People in need of help should be able to receive effective mental health care that is both affordable and accessible." **Guided by a**

socially responsible philosophy, NLBH offers individual, family, and group counseling, working with children, adolescents, and adults, employing over 20 therapists with diverse clinical backgrounds. During the pandemic, they switched almost entirely to teletherapy, which proved to be a valuable game-changer. 2021 was their busiest year yet, providing 14,500 sessions with 55% receiving reduced hourly fees as part of their charitable services programs.

NLBH's services are very much appreciated and needed, as **North** Carolina ranks 44th of 50 states in access and quality of behavioral health services for children.

Legacy Giving

In 2020, Americans gave a record \$471 billion to charities, a 5% increase over 2019. (*Giving USA 2021:* The Annual Report of Philanthropy for the Year 2020). As a WGN member, you are a part of that incredible number, demonstrating an annual commitment to improving the lives of women and children in Wake County.

You give generously now, but have you planned your future giving?

If you haven't, you're not alone. Even though individuals gave **\$42 billion through estate bequests** in 2020, only 1 in 9 individuals have included a charitable organization as part of their estate plan. Now is the time to change that!

At our 2021 Annual Meeting, <u>Kathryn Holding</u>, <u>NCCF's Vice President of Development and Donor Engagement</u>, spoke about "**Planning Your Charitable Legacy**" (see attached for her presentation). The topic may sound daunting, but it doesn't have to be. Consider these questions:

1. What organizations or causes would you like to support?

You likely have wonderful organizations you'd like to support through an estate gift; we hope you'll add the Women's Giving Network of Wake County to your list! You may support either the WGN gift fund (the fund that issues annual grants) or the WGN endowment (our permanent fund that is invested by the North Carolina Community Foundation and supplements WGN annual grantmaking).

2. How might charitable giving be incorporated into your current estate plan?

A common path for donors wishing to leave a charitable legacy is by making a gift through their will or trust. After you have made gifts to heirs, you may make a gift to charity of a set dollar amount or the residuary of your estate. This can be accomplished through a codicil to your existing will or a new will, simply by naming WGN or another nonprofit as beneficiary. Similar steps can be taken if you have a revocable trust. As with any gift planning, contact your attorney to make sure your estate plans are updated appropriately.

3. What assets will you give?

We are all unique in the assets that we hold. Talk with your advisors to determine if you have assets that are more beneficial to gift than others. For example, if you have retirement account assets, you can gift all or part to charity, potentially saving on future taxes. If you have other appreciated assets (e.g., stock, security, real estate, closely-held business interest), you may consider establishing a charitable remainder trust to take advantage of certain tax benefits, continue to enjoy the use of those assets, and ensure that the remainder goes to charity.

A lovely **donation to WGN** was made by Elsa Rachel Wolper **in memory of Noel McLaughlin** who passed away in April this year due to complications from a stroke. Noel was not only a WGN member for years (2007-2012) but also the Director of Communications at NCCF before retiring in 2019.

In the News

Did you know **The North Carolina Center for Nonprofits** is a resource that educates, connects and advocates for North Carolina's non-profits? Jeanne Tedrow, President & CEO, recently wrote an article titled <u>Better Together.</u> In her article, Ms. Tedrow **highlights the tumultuous last two years including COVID, race issues, and the increased demand** for services across all nonprofits.

As a WGN member, you likely are aware that many non-profits in Wake County have been scrambling for the last few years to raise funds, serve their existing constituencies, and increase their outreach. Ms. Tedrow encourages all non-profits to use this time of change to expand their diversity and inclusion goals on numerous levels to be better at what they do. She recommends, "To have an impact, we need to infuse equity, diversity, and inclusion at the individual, interpersonal, institutional, and systems levels. While we may feel limited in what we can do across the globe, we can influence and lead change that improves the lives of many in our own communities."

Wake County non-profits continue to integrate equity, diversity and inclusion into their core values. Your continued support as a WGN member helps us continue to provide high-impact grants to support the needs of women and children in our own community.

May was National Mental Health Month. Mental Health Month raises awareness about the impact of trauma, the importance of mental health and wellness in America, the treatment of mental illness, and the treatment of substance abuse just to name a few.

Organizations working on other key community needs, such as homelessness, hunger, physical and sexual abuse, child education gaps, drug addiction, etc. have had to shift funds to social workers that can manage mental health concerns in tandem with the key services they provide.

Through the WGN Grants Committee process, committee members are exposed to the numerous Wake County non-profits that provide mental health support to those they serve. These include Alliance Behavioral Health, NAMI and New Leaf Behavioral Health which was May's Educational Event. Your WGN membership makes an impact to support mental health services all year long.

Our nation has a growing mental health crisis post COVID. Many Wake County non-profits are actively offering help to those in need, and so is WGN because of members like you.

The **2022 grants cycle kicked off** in April. Working closely with the NCCF, **205 invitations** were sent to area non-profits this year. **THANK YOU to Meredith Bell and the NCCF team** for coordinating this effort! All these organizations serve women, children and families in Wake County and are invited to submit grant requests of at least \$10,000 for either **General Operating Expense or Special Projects**. Submitted proposals, once vetted by the NCCF, will be reviewed by the Grants Committee in June, and advancing organizations will be invited to submit a full grant application in July.

You won't want to miss this year's voting and IMPACT luncheon announcing the 2022 Grant Recipients so mark your calendars for **November 2**nd and stay tuned for details.
