Dear WGN Members,

With the Super Bowl behind us and the crepe myrtle budding ahead of us, I am starting to feel the renewed hope of spring. Perhaps it is the story of one young woman, Elizabeth, that I shared at our Annual Member Meeting on February 1, that has inspired me. You can access the recorded event here.

In 2018, Elizabeth and her son arrived at a church in Raleigh. They were homeless. Elizabeth's son had severe Down Syndrome and she was unable to leave him in order to work. They had been living in their car, and then inside Walmarts, moving from aisle to aisle, so as to not be discovered and sent into the cold and rain.

The church connected them to the <u>Catholic Charities Family Circle Program</u> (a 2018 WGN grantee.) The Family Circle Program helped them find housing for a year and a support group to help them with budgeting, health care, day care for her son and job searching for Elizabeth. They also connected her with <u>The Green Chair Project</u> (a 2019 WGN grantee) who helped Elizabeth furnish her new home.

Elizabeth learned the importance of budgeting. She also connected with <u>Alliance Medical Ministry</u> (a 2020 WGN grantee) and found health care and referrals to a program that could provide her son day and respite care. Through <u>Step Up Ministry</u> (a 2020 WGN grantee) Elizabeth updated her resume, honed her interview skills, and found not one, but TWO jobs.

Fast forward to today. Elizabeth moved to Johnston County and purchased her own home last year. Her son is involved in a great day program there which allows her to work. If that is not amazing enough, Elizabeth was awarded a grant to teach budgeting to folks in the county who find themselves in a situation similar to hers, several years ago.

Even though so many of you joined us at the Annual Member Meeting I just could not resist sharing this remarkable story with everyone, because it illustrates how your gifts impact not just one person, but a family, future generations, and an entire community!

At the Annual Member Meeting, we learned a bit more about the state-wide <u>Women's Fund of North Carolina</u>, to which a small portion (\$50) of annual dues for each member are contributed.

We also shared committee updates and opportunities to get involved. This can take the form of participating on a committee, helping with one-off projects, inviting friends along to our events or simply continuing your

financial support. If you are interested in getting involved, please do not hesitate to reach out to me or our new committee chairwomen listed in this newsletter. In either case, we are grateful for your ongoing commitment to WGN. We look forward to meeting again in person, when safe to do so!

Today, those little children have kids of their own and they are scattered around the country giving Sandy and her husband Tom the opportunity to travel. Their love of travel extends beyond our borders and in May they are traveling to Portugal for nine days to explore and enjoy a new



adventure. Sandy, like so many of our WGN members, has many irons in the fire. Her big project for 2022 is being an advocate for the organization One Wake with a focus on affordable housing.
