Understanding Tick Bites

PREVENT TICKBORNE DISEASES









- Wear repellent
- Check for ticks daily
- Shower soon after being outdoors
- Call your doctor if you get a fever or rash following a tick bite

Ticks can spread disease, including Lyme disease.

Protect yourself:

- Use Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)registered insect repellents containing DEET,
 picaridin, IR3535, oil of lemon eucalyptus, paramenthane-diol, or 2-undecanone. Always follow
 product instructions.
- Wear clothing treated with permethrin.
- Shower as soon as possible after spending time outdoors.
- Check for ticks daily. Ticks can hide under the armpits, behind the knees, in the hair, and in the groin.
- Tumble clothes in a dryer on high heat for 10 minutes to kill ticks on dry clothing after you come

indoors. If the clothes are

MCDH Vaccine Information


The COVID-19 Vaccine and Booster is available at the Department of Health for all individuals ages 6 months - 5 years old, 5-11 years old, or 18 and older.

Monkeypox

Who is at risk for Monkeypox?

Anyone can get monkeypox, although many of the individuals recently diagnosed with monkeypox self-identify as being men who have sex with other men. The virus enters the body through broken skin, or mucus membranes such as the eyes, nose, mouth or genitals. The virus does not spread exclusively through any one gender, sexual, or social network.

What does Monkeypox look like?

Transmission

Monkeypox is transmitted person-to-person through direct skin-to-skin contact, having contact with an infectious rash, through body fluids or through respiratory secretions. Such contact often occurs during prolonged, face-to-face contact or during intimate physical contact, such as kissing, cuddling or sex. People who do not have monkeypox symptoms cannot spread the virus to others. Learn more about how monkeypox is spread and a summary of the 2022 U.S. outbreak: https://bit.ly/3bczSjE

Vaccines & Eligibility

Vaccines are available in limited supply, at no cost, for individuals with known or suspected exposure to monkeypox. This includes:

- People who have been in close physical contact with someone diagnosed with monkeypox in the last 14 days (PEP)
- Men who have sex with men, or transgender individuals, who report any of the following
 in the last 90 days: Having multiple or anonymous sex partners, Being diagnosed with a
 sexually transmitted infection, or receiving HIV pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP)


COVID Testing
