Ten years have passed since Andra James, MD, MPH, Barbara Konkle, MD, Roshni Kulkarni, MD, and Ann-Marie Nazzaro, PhD, established the Foundation for Women & Girls with Blood Disorders (FWGBD). Their combined efforts created a ripple effect, impacting thousands of healthcare professionals across the country and the women and young women for whom they care. Since our start, FWGBD has educated over 8,000 professionals about the unique needs that women and girls with blood disorders face across the life span. And it has played a vital role in increasing women's access to knowledgeable providers and designated services for women and girls by raising awareness, advancing knowledge, fostering collaboration between key disciplines, and inspiring individuals and organizations into action.

All of this has been possible because of your support. Together, during 2020, new and old partnerships as well as individual donations helped us do what we do best: educate providers and change lives. This year, we:

- Launched our first membership offering and welcomed 256 professionals as official members of our organization
- Worked with 55 faculty/experts who donated their time and talent to our actions to raise awareness and advance the knowledge of their peers to improve the lives of women and girls with blood disorders
- Expanded our WGBD Learning Action Network (LAN) membership to include 200 members representing 71 institutions located in 40 states, as well as one (1) in Canada and one (1) in Utrecht, Netherlands
- · Marked our first decade by holding our first, biennial national conference, FWGBD 2020
- Convened our third WGSCD LAN meeting and our sixth WGBD LAN meeting virtually
- Hosted two live Webinars, both now archived on fwgbd.org
- Awarded one additional research fellowship award in Spring of 2020, and plan to award three more early in 2021, and
- Continued to publish original stories and answers to common questions to increase awareness, enhance knowledge and inspire action

2020 HIGHLIGHTS

For ten years, the Foundation has raised awareness and provided education of excellence to over 8,000 healthcare professionals about the unique needs of women and girls with blood disorders. This is a brief summary of some of our work performed this year.

APRIL 6, 2020 Live Virtual Workshop: CDC / FWGBD SCD Women's Reproductive Health Workshop

The purpose of this workshop was to convene leading experts/sickle cell center program directors/researchers/clinicians to better understand the issues, review current practices and evidence-based information on the optimal clinical management of women with SCD and SCT across the lifespan. The initial outcome of the meeting was a summary of the recommended strategies and next steps for the optimal treatment and management of women with SCD. The meeting was co-organized in partnership with the Division of Blood Disorders at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

National Hemophilia Foundation (NHF) Conference (Virtual)

FWGBD took part in NHF's second national public health conference, with speaker Dr. Kristina Haley (OHSU) presenting on 8/8/20 on the topic of Heavy Menstrual Bleeding in Adolescents: Lessons Learned from a Multi-disciplinary Clinic.

FWGBD MAC member Kim Smith-Whitley, MD chairing our session featuring Lydia H. Pecker, MD, Naomi Tepper, MD, MPH, FACOG, and Sarah O'Brien, MD, MSc who discussed issues related to fertility, fertility preservation and contraception for women with SCD. Potential research gaps and priorities were also discussed.

Live Webinar: Addressing the Management of ITP: An Introduction and Review of the Most Recent ASH 2019 Clinical Practice Guidelines for ITP

Presented by Dr. Terry Gernsheimer and moderated by Dr. Gowthami Arepally, our faculty reviewed the evidence-based recommendations and recently updated 2019 ASH ITP Clinical Guidelines covering the management of ITP. In addition, a special focus was on the maternal and potential fetal considerations professionals must address in making evidence-based decisions.

FWGBD 2020 PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

September 24-25, 2020

FWGBD 2020 was held on September 24 and 25, 2020, from 11 AM to 5 PM each day. COVID-19 was at its peak and the conference planners were prepared to pivot to a virtual platform and all speakers, sponsors and exhibitors were notified in advance the event would go on even if we could not meet in-person. Ultimately, FWGBD and the committee decided to focus on the wellbeing of its community while providing important education and decided to transition FWGBD 2020 to a virtual experience for the entire two days.

- Use more of the techniques shared by Dr. Norris with respect to communication with patients

2020 Special Award Focus Area: Bleeding Disorders Affecting Women and Girls (\$35,000) - The following award was made possible through a medical education grant from Shire.

Project Title:

Alternate-day versus daily oral iron therapy in adolescents with iron deficiency anemia and heavy menstrual bleeding: a randomized clinical trial

Project Description:

Dr. Kebodeaux's study aims to optimize the treatment of iron deficiency anemia due to heavy menstrual bleeding. The results of her project will provide valuable pilot data that can be expanded upon to improve the treatment of iron deficiency anemia in adolescent females with heavy menstrual bleeding and bleeding disorders which in turn lead to improved quality of life for patients.

Since 2016, FWGBD has awarded \$320,000* in research awards.

The objectives of the Promoting XXcellence in Women's Health: Optimal Management of Women and Girls with Blood Disorders awards are to:

- 1. Foster and sustain interest/knowledge of the next-generation of healthcare providers, i.e., physician-researchers working in blood or bleeding disorders affecting women/girls.
- 2. Foster collaboration between two core disciplines for WGBD the Hematologist and the Women's Reproductive Health Specialist.
- 3. Support an opportunity for junior faculty or fellows to conduct research in these important areas.


