

A FOCUS ON SCD AND WOMEN'S REPRODUCTIVE HEALTHCARE

On October 28, 2021, FWGBD alongside the American Society of Hematology, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, Association of Maternal & Child Health Programs, and the Sickle Cell Disease Association of America, was a proud co-sponsor of a sickle cell disease and reproductive health virtual congressional briefing.

Their Lives Depend On US: Rising to the Challenge of Providing High Quality, Evidence-Based Reproductive Health Care for Women and with Sickle Cell Disease was inspired by the meeting that FWGBD held in conjunction with the CDC, the work of our WGSCD LAN members, and with ASH's working group on the reproductive needs of women with SCD of which FWGBD is a member. Close to 300 people registered for the briefing, including congressional staff, representatives from SCD community groups, members of the cosponsoring organizations, and the 100+ organizations in the SCD Coalition.

Dr. Lydia Pecker gave an excellent overview of the current sate of reproductive healthcare for women with SCD and proposed several suggested strategies to improve the outcomes.

Barriers to receiving high quality, comprehensive care for sickle cell disease (SCD) are a significant problem in the United States, resulting in health care disparities and inequities. This is especially true for women with SCD who are pregnant: they are ten times more likely to die in childbirth than non-Hispanic Black women without SCD. This disparity is compounded by the fact that the maternal mortality rate for all non-Hispanic Black women is already more than double the U.S. maternal mortality rate. Women with SCD require high-quality, multidisciplinary reproductive health care; their deaths are not inevitable. Comprehensive care is proven to decrease the risk of adverse pregnancy outcomes, including maternal mortality.

RESEARCH AWARDS

The objectives of the *Promoting XXcellence in Women's Health: Optimal Management of Women and Girls with Blood Disorders (WGBD)* awards are to:

- 1. Foster and sustain interest/knowledge of the next-generation of healthcare providers working in blood or bleeding disorders affecting women/girls.
- 2. Foster collaboration between two core disciplines for WGBD the Hematologist and the OB-GYN (or Women's Reproductive Health Specialist).
- 3. Support an opportunity for junior faculty or fellows to conduct research in these important areas.



AWARD FOCUS AREA: BLOOD DISORDERS - ALL BLOOD DISORDERS (\$15,000)

DR. ANDREW'S STORY

Lauren Andrew, MD is currently an obstetrics and gynecology resident with the University of Calgary in Canada, researching clinical trial design for postpartum women with risk of venous thromboembolism (VTE). She is also on target to begin a master's degree program on women's health and VTE prevention.

"There has been a call from the research community to include and encourage participation of pregnant and postpartum women in well-designed clinical trials to provide high-quality data," explains Dr. Andrew, adding that this participation can result in critical learnings around childbirth.

However, it's not always easy to enroll pregnant women in clinical studies that evaluate health in the period immediately following labor and delivery. The postpartum period can be a stressful time with unique challenges for women, particularly those with blood and bleeding disorders. "We must better understand patient factors that contribute to or hinder research participation during the postpartum period to guide clinical practice and improve women's lives," she says.

Dr. Andrew's FWGBD funding will support her qualitative interview study, offering a unique opportunity to explore:

- Randomized trial participation from the patient perspective
- VTE and bleeding risk
- Shared decision making
- Informed consent
- Patient perceptions of their postpartum VTE risk
- Physician perspectives on postpartum VTE prevention

This study will enhance another pilot trial by a broader team of researchers: Postpartum Aspirin to Reduce Thromboembolism Undue Morbidity (PARTUM), which weighs the feasibility of a larger international randomized trial evaluating aspirin versus placebo in postpartum women at risk of developing venous thromboembolism.

DR. OVED'S STORY




SPECIAL AWARD FOCUS AREA: BLEEDING DISORDERS (\$35,000) Joseph Oved, MD is currently an instructor in the Division of Hematology at the Children's Hospital of Pennsylvania (CHOP) in Bala Cynwyd, Pennsylvania.

Dr. Oved's FWGBD funding will support his study which is to examine the downstream effects of this gut microbiome dysbiosis and the shifts in the metabolomic signatures and immunoglobulin-pathogen coating that results from these microbe alterations. The data from these studies will inform a predictive modeling algorithm to help determine which patients are not only at risk for developing disease but those who are at risk for progressing to chronic/refractory disease.

The second aim of this study will be to expand the gut microbiome sequencing of their ITP cohort to allow for subpopulation analyses focusing on adolescent females with bleeding symptoms in the setting of newly diagnosed ITP.

Ultimately, they will use the results from this pilot as the basis for future longitudinal studies of gut microbial dysbiosis throughout the course of disease and resolution as well as metabolomic studies to elucidate shifts in relative concentrations of biochemical molecules resulting from microbial perturbations. These results will be important for defining new targetable pathways involved in ITP pathogenesis.

DR. LIM'S STORY



SPECIAL AWARD FOCUS AREA: BLEEDING DISORDERS (\$35,000) Ming Y. Lim, MBBChir, MSCR is currently medical director of the Utah Center for Bleeding & Clotting Disorders at University of Utah Health. She earned her medical degree at Cambridge University, England and completed her residency in internal medicine at the Mayo Clinic Rochester and her fellowship training in hematology and oncology at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Dr. Lim specializes in the field of hemostasis and thrombosis. The focus of Dr. Lim's research with this funding is "to determine pregnancy outcomes and postpartum contraception in women with von Willebrand disease using a unique, statewide, population-based cohort that is linked to electronic health records, the Utah Population Database." Von Willebrand disease (VWD) is a common bleeding disorder, which affects approximately one in 100 individuals. People with VWD experience delayed or abnormal blood clotting. For pregnant women with VWD, there can be heavy, hard-to-stop bleeding after childbirth.

"It is well-recognized that women with bleeding disorders are underrecognized and underdiagnosed," explains Dr. Lim. "There is a critical need to raise awareness for both healthcare providers and patients to improve the care of women with von Willebrand disease. My project is a first step in identifying the magnitude of the problem in the contemporary era."

Dr. Lim believes the successful completion of her project will have a positive impact on the VWD community by providing the necessary evidence to inform institutional, local and regional service providers, insurance payers and state policymakers to enhance clinical services, tailor educational programs and track outcomes on the needs of women with VWD.

"This will strengthen the care of women with von Willebrand locally and regionally, leading to a reduction in pregnancy-related morbidity and mortality," she says. Next up, Dr. Lim plans to conduct a needs assessment for women with VWD in Utah to examine trends in acute care utilization across all ages and identify factors associated with increased acute care utilization. She also plans to engage patients and providers in a qualitative study to understand the barriers and facilitators to a timely diagnosis of inherited bleeding disorders.

In the second of FWGBD's *Case Conversation* series, our expert faculty, **Dr. Andrea Roe and Dr. Tami Chrisentery-Singleton**, will review the upcoming journal article, "*Contraceptive use and preferences among females with sickle cell disease*."

In this study, patients with sickle cell disease were surveyed about their contraceptive usage and preferences; results identified that women with sickle cell disease are less likely to use contraception, and use different kinds of contraception, than the general US population. Our expert faculty will illustrate the limitations in providing optimal patient care due to the need for research on contraception usage and decision-making, and will provide strategies for discussing contraception with women with SCD that will lead to improved patient health. The discussion will be followed by an interactive Q&A session with participants.
